In the first book, for instance, just as Pierston has promised marriage to Avice Caro, an island girl who is, like himself, of the old stock there, and whom he respects largely because she does not embody the Well-Beloved, the latter lady turns up in the person of Marcia Bencomb, and the sculptor deserts Avice abruptly and returns to London. He does not marry Marcia, but goes on making capital out of his emotions by translating his unattainable dream into plaster, winning popularity thereby. When he comes back to the island, after twenty years, he finds the creature of his visions in the daughter of Avice, and would marry her if he could.

Thomas Hardy and Empire Mar 16 2021 Unlike many of his contemporaries, Thomas Hardy is not generally recognized as an imperial writer, even though he wrote during a period of major expansion of the British Empire and in spite of the many allusions to the Roman Empire and Napoleonic Wars in his writing. Jane L. The paper focuses on two novels - "The Pursuit of the Well-Beloved" and "The Well-Beloved" - and is divided into two main chapters, while the latter novel is preferred. The first half of the work is dedicated to the Aristotelian concept of the tragic hero, its usage and the conditions for a protagonist to be labeled as such. In addition, some of Thomas Hardy's opinions on humanity, fate and nature will be shown and discussed with several sources, as well as his attitude towards tragic heroes. In the second half the main protagonist is thoroughly examined in both novels in order to find his tragic flaw and understand his character. By the analysis of various tragic effects depicted in the source texts the thesis tries to argue whether Pierston fulfills those conditions and is a tragic hero or whether he simply lacks the needed qualities.

This self-division, Mark Ford says, can be traced not only in works explicitly set in London but in his most regionally circumscribed novels.

The Well-beloved Sep 21 2021 This remarkable novel was first serialised as *The Pursuit of the Well-Beloved* in 1892, between *Tess of the d'Urbervilles* (1891) and *Jude the Obscure* (1895). It was thoroughly reworked several times before appearing as a book in 1897. The definitive version was published in 1912, by which time Hardy had ceased writing novels and turned his attention to poetry. These successive revisions over a period of twenty years are testament to both the author's literary perfectionism and the importance he ascribed to this particular novel. Jocelyn Pierston returns to his childhood Wessex as a young sculptor of twenty, in search of an ideal he describes his Well-Beloved; she takes form in successive women, who never manage to remain The Ideal for long. Pierston is astonished to discover the Well-Beloved in his childhood neighbour Avice, a beautiful, simple woman fashioned from local stock. He proposes: she accepts, but at the last minute slips away. Twenty years later, aged forty and still searching for the Well-Beloved, Pierston falls in love with Avice's daughter... and another twenty years later her granddaughter. has stopped, and history is doomed to repeat itself. Proust was fascinated by this tale - and the pursuit of Avice I, II and III foreshadows the link between Odette and Gilberte in *A la recherche du temps perdu*, with the mother-daughter bond marking the passage of time in both works. Proust read Hardy's tale when *Recherche* was no more than a sketch, writing in a 1910 letter such a beautiful work, which unfortunately resembles - yet a thousand times better - what I myself am doing. This is an exquisite short story exploring the theme of the well-beloved from the female point of view...

Alicia's Diary Feb 12 2021 August 20.-A terrible announcement came this morning; and we are in deep trouble. I have been quite unable to steady my thoughts on anything to-day till now-half-past eleven at night-and I only attempt writing these notes because I am too restless to remain idle, and there is nothing but waiting and waiting left for me to do.
